

T LEAST 120 NEWSPAPERS IN THE U.S. have shut down since January 2008, according to Paper Cuts, a website tracking the newspaper industry. More than 21,000 jobs at 67 newspapers have vaporized in that time, according to the site. Newspapers are losing their relevance¹ in the lives of a majority of Americans, particularly younger readers. Many industry analysts agree many more papers will soon become extinct. Daily subscriptions per household began a steady decline in the 1920s, yet the newspaper industry adapted and thrived²

The rise of the free press

NYONE RIDING THE LONDON UNDER-GROUND, a Dutch commuter train or the Seoul metro in rush hour will see people reading newspapers. Not the regular traditional broadsheet paid-for newspapers but mostly free tabloids. There are now free newspapers in 56 countries. Market leader Metro distributes more than 8 million copies daily, while other companies publish more than 35 million copies. These copies are read by at least 80 million people daily. In four European countries (Iceland, Denmark, Spain and Portugal) more free than paid papers are distributed (Monday to Friday) while in more than a dozen European countries the newspaper with the highest circulation is a free paper.
